## SLTATC's Salt Lake Campus is moving

SLTATC is pleased to announce that its Salt Lake Campus will be moving from 1655 E. 3300 South to a new location: 3760 Highland Dr., one mile away and "just around the corner" from the old location. Many will recognize the new building as the former location of the BYU Salt Lake Center.

According to SLTATC Acting President Scott Snelson, "This is a wonderful opportunity for the college. The new location will offer us additional space and flexibility in offering training programs
